Over the course of my study, Dr. Willey had a hand in much of my education (with regard to the music industry) that made a difference in the outcome of my career as a music industry professional. In the interest of showing direct correlation between Dr. Willey's instruction and my various work after school, I'd like to list them individually highlighting the difference that Dr. Willey has made...

Dr. Willey (usually just "Doc" to me) was the instructor of the Music Business classes offered at the university. The class covered a wide variety of subjects and was a great stepping stone to understanding many principles of the industry as a whole. The one thing that stuck with me the most, was him saying that the number 1 rule of being a music business professional was to "Always Be Available!" Having worked solely in the music industry since graduating 8 years ago, I have always tried to keep this motto...It works! Also during this class, Dr. Willey helped clarify the role of promotion in the entertainment field, explaining concepts that would eventually be very useful when I was a promoter/ talent buyer for 307 Downtown, a popular music venue, for several years.
